

Home Care: A Valued Path for Better Lives and Smarter **Healthcare Spending**

Home care is essential for addressing our healthcare system challenges and meeting the needs and desires of our older population while also generating significant economic benefits to the economy.



Home care acts as a first line of defence in delayed discharges and chronic care planning as well as facilitating our older population's desire to stay at home longer.



Our study highlights that every €1 million invested in home care generates an estimated additional €1.9 million in economic benefits to the Irish economy. This in turn is associated with on average c 50 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) jobs, along with freeing up hospital beds and nursing home beds for those most in need in the Country.



Based on 2024 delivery levels, Ireland's home care sector generated an estimated €2 billion in economic impact, with HCCI members providing essential support to c. 25,000 older people nationwide through their network of over 12,000 carers.

Home care is a vital component in overcoming healthcare system challenges by delivering timely and person centred care to individuals in need.

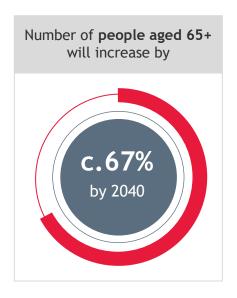

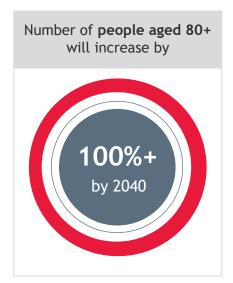
Out of 133,000 patients seen by community specialist teams for older persons in 2024¹, 81% were discharged home with community-based interventions providing the necessary care.

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Shifting Demographics & Need for Home Support

Ireland's population is ageing rapidly. According to the latest ESRI projections²:





The ESRI Study opines that the significant increase in our ageing population is expected to drive the demand for annual home support by a minimum of c. 57% up to 91% by 2040, reaching over 45 million hours from 2022 levels of c. 28.7 million care hours (both public and privately funded).

The **independent** sector delivers **62**% of the budgeted HSE funded care hours³ to service users thereby highlighting the significant role played by independent home care operators on the health care outcomes of Ireland's older population.

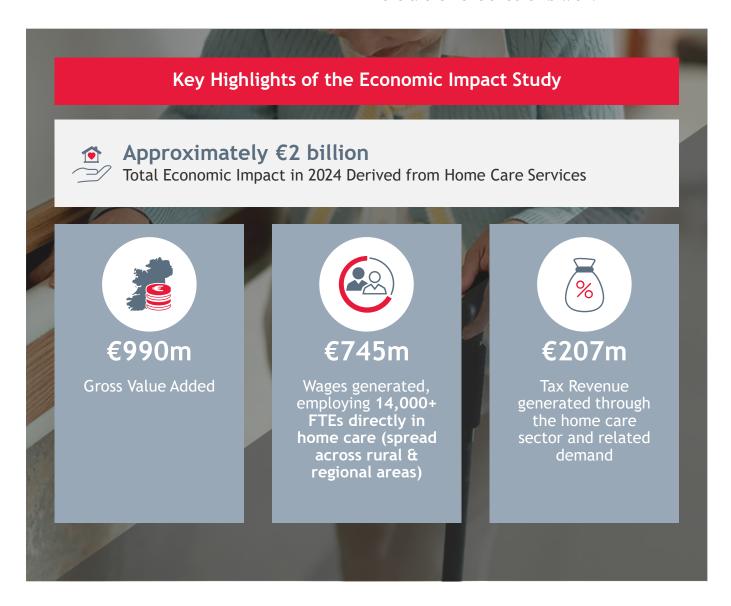
The Economic Impact of the Home Care Sector

Circa €2 billion per annum

Utilising survey data garnered from participating HCCI members along with publicly available home care data, BDO in conjunction with their Economic Consultants undertook an assessment of the estimated economic impact of home care services in Ireland (both public & independent providers).

Our study reveals that home care is not just a compassionate service meeting the needs and desires of our older population - it is also a strategic economic driver.

The total economic impact of the home care sector in Ireland in 2024 is estimated at c. €2 billion comprising of both direct and knockon economic benefits. The diagram below highlights the key variables contributing to the aforementioned €2 billion.

Staffing in terms of both recruitment and retention is the main barrier to the delivery of home care.



The wait times for a carer⁴ is a national problem with 5,556 persons on the wait list as of December 2024.

However, there is also regional disparity - for example as of Dec-24, CHO 4 (Cork/Kerry) had the highest waiting list of people at c. 1,000 vis-à-vis CHO 9 (North Dublin) which had no waiting list.

Value for Money of Home Care

Whilst recognising the importance of long term residential care (LTRC) and nursing home care within the continuum of care, the graphic below highlights the cost effectiveness and value for money of home care in comparison to hospital care (delayed discharges) and nursing home or long-term residential care.

Home care is more cost-effective than hospital beds (cost savings in relation to delayed discharges) and LTRC, when provided to individuals for whom home support is medically appropriate.

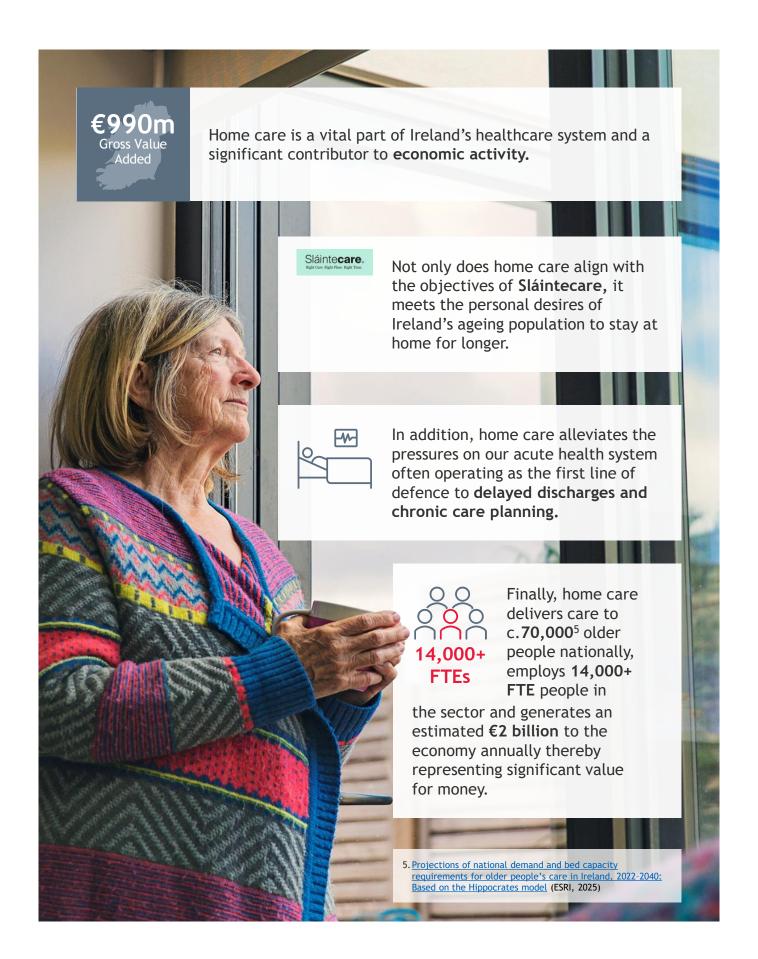

Average cost per person per week for Home Support Services vs Nursing Home (Fair Deal) vs Hospital care*

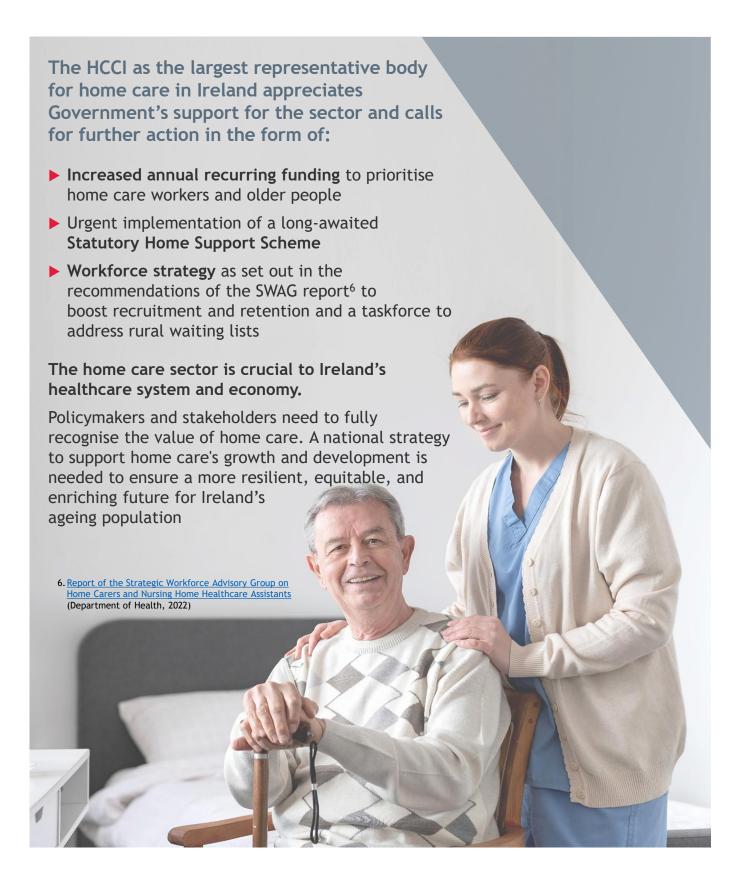
